Conductor **SUN MIN LEE** is the Robert Cutler Endowed Professor of Practice in Choral Arts at Lehigh University in Bethlehem, PA, where she is the associate director of Lehigh Choral Arts and the director of the women's choir *Dolce* since 2011. Under her direction, *Dolce* has performed in several concert venues in the Bethlehem area as well as in tours to Hawaii and Italy; with Lehigh Choral Arts, she performed Beethoven's *Mass in C* in 2014. Ms. Lee also teaches aural skills for both beginners and advanced musicians, and is the overseer of the voice program at Lehigh. Prior to joining Lehigh, Ms. Lee was on the

conducting faculty at Westminster Choir College in Princeton, New Jersey and at Hobart and William Smith Colleges in Geneva, New York.

During her residency at Westminster Choir College, Ms. Lee directed the Chapel Choir and conducted the Schola Cantorum and Symphonic Choir. Under her direction, the Chapel Choir made its debut at Carnegie Hall in 2008 and the Symphonic Choir performed Mozart's *Coronation Mass* with the New York Philharmonic Orchestra in 2006. She also collaborated with many renowned guest conductors, including Anton Armstrong, Stephen Paulus, Kathy Romey, Dale Warland, Mark Laycock, Fernando Raucci, Peter Bagley, and Lorin Maazel.

Constantly in demand as a guest conductor and a clinician, she has appeared with all-state choirs and county festival honors choirs, as well as giving conducting workshops and master classes, in the eastern and southeastern United States. Ms. Lee has directed community choruses and church choirs in New York and New Jersey, including, most recently, the Masterwork Chorus and Masterwork *Camerata* of New Jersey.

Ms. Lee earned a Bachelor of Church Music at the Presbyterian College and Theological Seminary in South Korea and an advanced diploma from the Zoltán Kodály Pedagogical Institute of Music in Kecskemét, Hungary. She received a Masters degree from Westminster Choir College, and has done graduate work at the Eastman School of Music. Her past teachers have included Chang Hoon Park, Peter Erdei, Joseph Flummerfelt, Andrew Megill, and William Weinert.
